Message from the Executive Director

Communication will be a key focus for the Secretariat in the months ahead. We're working to develop a visual identity for the Consortium and common, agreed-upon language and tools we can use with a wide range of audiences. We are also developing a new website that can serve as a first point of contact for anyone seeking information on comprehensive school health in Canada.

We are, of course, continuing our work in other areas, including addressing the data needs of the health and education sectors and moving forward with a plan to evaluate the work of the Consortium. Since our last issue, we have also made a written submission to the House of Commons Standing Committee on Health which has now become part of the records of the study. The report on Childhood Obesity was presented in the House of Commons on March 27th.

With a number of major conferences and meetings in the months ahead, we have important opportunities to share information, engage partners, and inform Canadians about the benefits of comprehensive school health initiatives.

One of the best ways to do this is by sharing our successes – whether research-based or anecdotal. Ideally, we should be able to point to successes from coast to coast to coast.

So please let us know what's working in your jurisdictions: what's been done, and what results it's produced. Tell us your stories. Then all Consortium members can use the information (along with the other tools we're developing) to demonstrate the value of healthy schools – and help this movement gain even more momentum nationwide.

New Physical Education Curriculum

The Ministry of Education has released a new Integrated Resource Package (IRP) for teachers of K to 7 Physical Education. The curriculum emphasizes daily opportunities for students to participate in a range of physical activities and to develop attitudes which support healthy, active lifestyles.

Tobacco Free School Grounds

The BC government has introduced legislation banning tobacco and smoking in public places including schools. Many school boards already have policies banning smoking on school

grounds but the proposed legislation broadens the scope of the ban to include all user groups on school property as well as property leased by school boards for the delivery of educational programs. Exceptions can be made for ceremonial use of tobacco in relation to a traditional aboriginal cultural activity.

The legislative amendment is part of B.C.'s Tobacco Control Strategy which includes school-based programming, public education, protection from second hand smoke, support for cessation, legislation and legal action. Ontario is Walking to a Record.... And you're invited!

World Record Walk, to be held on October 3, 2007 at 12:30 pm EST.

The World Record Walk 2007 aims to break the existing Guinness World Record for the largest number of people walking one kilometer simultaneously. The current Guinness record was broken in September 2006 by Western Australia with 105,424 participants.

Green Communities Canada will be mobilizing schools across Ontario to participate in this exciting event by walking on October 3rd. They are teaming the event up with their International Walk to School Week celebrations and challenging all students to walk one kilometre that day.

We think it would be cool to spread this event from coast to coast to shatter the record held by Western Australia and give students across the country the chance to be part of something really big! Interested provinces/territories would be required to fund and coordinate their own World Record Walk activities. However, Green

Communities Canada would provide the interactive website as the focal point for the event, incorporating downloadable resources ready for use and easy customization, in addition to the tracking software for cross-Canada results.

So spread the word throughout the communities in your province or territory – everyone can be part of this exciting event: **Schools, Clubs, Community Groups, Workplaces, Municipal Governments and Individuals.**

The **World Record Walk 2007** will start a “walkolution” aimed at creating a culture of walking by:

Research Briefs

Effectiveness of School Programs in Preventing Childhood Obesity.

Dr. Paul Veugelers of the University of Alberta's School of Public Health has received funding of \$252,000 from the Canadian Population Health Initiative (CPHI) of the Canadian Institute for Health Information for his proposal to study the effectiveness of a school board-wide program promoting health in schools to address obesity

among primary school students. This study will build on his earlier work, published in 2005 in the *American Journal of Public Health*, entitled "Effectiveness of School Programs in Preventing Childhood Obesity: A Multilevel Comparison" co-authored by Paul Veugelers and Angela L. School Garden Project in Australia

The December 2006 issue of the *Health Promotion Journal of Australia* features an article by Antonietta Viola entitled "Evaluation of the Outreach School Garden Project: Building the capacity of two Indigenous remote school communities to integrate nutrition into the core school curriculum". The project used a school-based garden as an education tool to integrate nutrition into the core school curriculum. Students' knowledge and skills in nutrition and gardening were reportedly increased as a result of the project. Promoting Free Play

Play England, a five-year project to promote strategies for free play and to support play providers in England, has called for a national government play strategy. During Obesity Awareness Week (March 11th to 17th) Play England said that free play may be the key to the "everyday activity" that children need alongside healthier food choices. They cited a report in the *British Medical Journal* that suggests the main solution to the obesity epidemic in young children is to "reduce television viewing and promote playing".
